Medicare Patients to Receive New ID Cards

The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) is preparing an initiative designed to combat fraud and better protect patients by changing the Medicare ID cards. April 2018 Medicare ID cards **will no longer contain social security numbers** instead they will use a unique randomly-selected number called Medicare Beneficiary Identifier (MBI), an 11 digit number using alpha and numeric characters. The MBI will replace the current Health Insurance Claim Number (HICN), which is based on the individual's social security number.

Medicare is proposing a transition period that will span from April 2018 through December 31, 2019, in which practices will be able to use both the new MBI and the current HICN. However, the MBI will be the only identifier accepted after December 31, 2019.

Action practices can take now to prepare?

- Advise Medicare beneficiaries that their identification cards will be changing
- Verify your Medicare patients' addresses. If the address you have on file differs from Medicare addresses you receive on electronic eligibility transactions, ask your patients to contact the Social Security Administration to update their Medicare records.
- Test your system and work with your billing staff to ensure that your medical office will be ready to use the new MBI format.

To help members with the transition, ISMS is planning to develop a dedicated web page, publish a corresponding issue brief and offer a webinar for physicians and office staff. Expedited Licensure Process for Multi-State Practice

If you wish to practice in other states in addition to Illinois there is now a fast-track process in place to obtain licenses outside our states borders. This initiative, spearheaded by the Federation of State Medical Boards (FSMB) and supported by the ISMS now provides an expedited process for eligible physicians to obtain medical licenses in other states participating in the Compact.

The Illinois application process came online in September 2017. The fast-track process will be very useful for Illinois physicians who practice telemedicine or want to more easily expand their practice into other states. UnitedHealthcare to Stop Reimbursing Certain Consultation Services Codes

UnitedHealthcare (UHC) is imposing a new reimbursement policy. Payment for certain outpatient and inpatient consultation CPT codes (99241-99245 and 99251-99255) will no longer be permitted for claims with dates of service **on or after October 1, 2017**. Instead UHC will reimburse the appropriate level of evaluation and management (E/M) procedure code to describe the office visit, hospital care, nursing facility care or home service care. Service must be billed the most appropriate **non-consultation E/M code**.

UHC states that the eliminated reimbursement for consultation codes is offset through increased E/M procedure code payment, as well as increased compensation for specific codes built into the relative value units (RVU) formula. Medicare Reimbursements

Medicare will reimburse you for discussing advance care planning with patients. ISMS offers a helpful resource that can help you "break the ice" on advance care planning talks. A Personal Decision is a **free** publication that provides practical information, sample forms and guidance on advance directives – current with Illinois law. 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## **President's Message**

Greetings and happy autumn. I pen this letter to you as much is swirling around Washington and Illinois!

At the state level your legislative advocates from the WCMS and ISMS worked tirelessly in Springfield to help pass the Network Adequacy and Transparency Act which was signed by Governor Rauner. This is a strong lie for our patients and to help physicians navigate complex care models so that multiple formularies and systems are kept up to date. No more having to fumble around trying to get our patients better care!

Speaking of better care, we know that our training and years spent going our craft make us experts in our respective fields and specialties. Your county medical society continues to advocate for bills which protect our scope of practice and limit under-qualified providers from providing standard care to our patients.

At the national level the American Medical Association continues to work to make sure that any changes to the Affordable Care Act do not damage our power to provide expert healthcare. The AMA is committed to keeping our profession strong and making sure we remain at the table as bargaining goes forward.

To that end, I urge all of you to contact your members of Congress regarding an issue dear to my heart. On October I funding for the Children's Health Insurance Plan (CHIP) expired. The program which historically has had bipartisan support is authorized through 2019 but was only funded to this year. Currently, this leaves 9 million children without health insurance and their families wondering what their next steps will be if their child gets sick. In Illinois, All Kids (our CHIP program) provides access to over 330,000 children across our state. Please join me and the efforts of the AMA and the American Academy of Pediatrics as we continue to fight to restore this strong and vital program to our country's children.

I write this letter as my last I shall pen to you as my term comes to a conclusion this January. I thank you for your membership on our organization and your tireless efforts to provide healthcare to the citizens of Winnebago County. It has been a privilege to serve as your president these past two years. Even though I am leaving Rockford I look forward to continuing to work with all of you through our team at the Illinois State Medical Society as well as the AMA.

I hope to see you all at the annual meeting in January and I wish you and your families a blessed and joyous holiday season.

## **Illinois State Medical Society Legislative Updates**

## **Medical Practice Extension Act**

Governor Rauner recently signed Senate Bill 1348 which extended the sunset of the Medical Practice Act until December 31, 2019. The bill passed the General Assembly unanimously.

This two year renewal is an important move in the right direction. In recent years, the General Assembly has only authorized one-year renewals. Having to reauthorize the Act each year opens the door to unnecessary tinkering with the legal foundation of the practice of medicine.

The Medical Practice Act spells out the licensure standards and disciplinary proceeding for Illinois physicians. Without it, any person, regardless of qualification could practice medicine in Illinois without restriction or penalty.

## **Network Adequacy and Transparency Act**

Illinois lawmakers cleared ISMS' top legislative priority, the Network Adequacy and Transparency Act (NAT Act). The measure (House Bill 311) will be transmitted to Governor Rauner, ISMS has communicated to the governor, urging him to sign the bill into law.

Key provisions of House Bill 311 are:

- Insurance companies will have to make sure their networks meet patients' needs – that means enough health facilities and doctors, including specialists, in close proximity to where the policyholders live.
- Health plans must be more transparent; provider directories must be kept up-to-date. If a doctor or hospital is dropped from a network, the insurance company will have to notify patients in a timely fashion to help the patient avoid out of network charges. Doctors will also have new notification requirements if they choose to leave a network.
- No disruption in patient care. If a patient's doctor is dropped from the network and the patient is pregnant or has a complex medical condition, that patient will be able to stay with his or her same doctor long enough to make a smooth transition without getting charged extra.

## **Organ Donor Registry Expanded**

Governor Rauner signed an ISMS supported bill to expand Illinois' organ donation registry. This new law allows 16 and 17 year olds to join the state's First Person Consent Organ/ Tissue Donor Registry when they receive the driver's license or identification card. The bipartisan legislation was initiated by the Secretary of State's office, backed by ISMS and passed the General Assembly with no opposition.

## Medicaid Telemedicine

Medicaid Telemedicine – House Bill 2907 and Senate Bill 2069 were introduced to provide that HFS shall not require that a physician or other licensed health care professional be physically present in the same room as the patient for the entire time during which the patient is receiving tele-psychiatry and telemedicine services. House bill 2907 passed both houses and is awaiting consideration by the governor

## **Emergency Refills**

Senator Stadelman introduced Senate Bill 179 with amends the Pharmacy Practice Act to authorize a pharmacist to refill a patient's prescription without prescriber authorization if the pharmacist is unable to contact the prescriber after a reasonable effort, the failure to refill the prescription may result in an interruption of therapeutic regimen or create patient suffering, and the prescription is not for a controlled substance. The bill also provided that the pharmacist must inform the prescriber at the earliest convenience of the emergency refills and the prescriptions may be refilled pursuant to the provisions of a period of time reasonably necessary for the pharmacist to secure prescriber authorization. The law limits emergency refills to the supply needed during the emergency period, not to exceed 30 days. The WCMS and the Pharmaceutical Association participated in a press conference with Senator Stadelman announcing the passage of this legislation.
